
Wairoa School acknowledged Reconciliation Week with the establishment of a Bush Tucker Garden, music, dancing and a yarning activity.

Students participated in a variety of activities from 27th May to the 3rd June for Reconciliation Week 2021. Students who are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander shared information about themselves, their mob, family history and life with their peers through an interactive book. Daniel, our music facilitator, performed our favourite Indigenous Australian songs and students enjoyed singing, drumming, shaking and tapping along. We have also established a Bush Tucker Garden filled with natives such as Midgen Berries, Sea Celery, Bush Mint and a Lemon Myrtle tree. Students were very excited to plant and water them! We are looking forward to seeing these plants grow and using them in our kitchen garden program.

Wellbeing

We remain vigilant at Wairoa School about the health and wellbeing of students, staff and our community. We continue to have a strong focus on hygiene practices including regular handwashing and sanitising. We appreciate that students who are unwell do not come to school. If they are unwell at school, we will contact you and you will need to collect them immediately. Students should be at school unless:

- they have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition and the expected timeframe
- they are currently unwell.

The school informed families of a case of chicken pox and seek your support in being aware of the symptoms and notifying the school is diagnosed with chicken pox or any other childhood illness.

Many of our students have health and medical needs which may be further compromised through illness.

School times

It would be appreciated if parents bring their children to school between 9 and 9.20am. This allows them to be prepared for the day and to participate in morning fitness activities. This will reduce the disruption to all students learning programs and allow for an effective morning routine.

Similarly the afternoons can be hectic in classrooms as students and staff complete tasks and finish the days learning with routines and activities. There are some exceptions for an early pick up, however, it is appreciated if parents will remain at the front door to collect their child at the end of the school day.

Student reports

Our teachers are preparing semester 1 student reports. These will include photographs and comments that highlight each child's skills as a learner. There will be comments about particular areas of strength and areas for development. The report will be sent home as a hard copy and it will also be emailed to parents. We always appreciate the feedback and comments from families about the reports.

Safety in the carpark

Parents and carers are asked the support the safety of our school community when entering and leaving the school grounds.

Enter and leave the school grounds slowly;

Ensure your car is turned off when waiting to drop off or pick up;

We encourage the students to get in and out of the vehicle as independently as possible;

Wait until the staff member in high viz indicates that it is safe to move off.

- Black shoes or appropriate sports shoes



Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD quidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Externally funded service providers delivering health, disability and wellbeing services to students

The Department of Education has guidelines about access to students at school by externally funded service providers.

There are 4 key steps:

- 1. Ask the school in writing
- 2. Consult with class teacher the details of the service and goals to be achieved and possible time options.
- 3. Principal considers your request taking into account the needs of your child, other students and the operations of the school
- 4. If agreed, the service needs to enter into an agreement with the school and meet important legal requirements.

All requests will be in line with these guidelines and arrangements for 2021 will be considered by the school staff once a request has been made by the parents. The parent request letter will be required to indicate the specific service. The goals to be supported by the therapists will need to specifically support the students Personalised Learning and Support Plan goals.

The consultation process will be ongoing and some direct intervention services may be possible. Direct interventions within the school will be reviewed each term so that there is equitable access for all students.
